Course Description

Welcome to your discussion section.

This course provides an introduction to the study of arts, technology, and emerging communication through a focus on five key questions:

- (1) What is culture?
- (2) What is technology?
- (3) How have the relationships among humans, technologies, and culture changed over time?
- (4) How do we understand the multiple and (often) contradictory effects of technology?
- (5) How do we imagine the cultural possibilities (both positive and negative) of emerging technologies?

This aim of this course is to encourage students to think more complexly about technology, about culture, and about the many ways in which the two are always inextricably linked. This will be the foundation for the development of a rich and nuanced technological imagination, which is, in turn, the foundation for learning and research in ATEC.

Once a week, all students attend a 75-minute LECTURE that presents historical background and social context for the exploration of key concepts. Lectures incorporate multiple media: text, images, photographs, animation, video, sound, and music. These sessions might also include Q & A, participation activities, live demonstrations, or performances.

Each week, students also attend in a small-group DISCUSSION SECTION led by an ATEC Teaching Assistant who will assign readings, individual writing exercises, and collaborative creative activities that explore key topics and new ideas. These sessions are designed to stimulate discussion about issues and questions related to the weekly lecture or course topics.

Student Learning Objectives/Outcomes

Students will...

- Research the technocultural histories of significant object or process
- <u>Describe</u> how an object evokes meaning

- Analyze an object to elaborate how technology and culture are related
- <u>Create</u> an original analysis of an object that illustrates the complex relationship of human beings, technology, and culture
- Read academic writing, so as to engage in informed discussions about significant topics
- Apply critical method of analysis to open-ended questions
- Synthesize information from multiple sources to create new insights
